Bender, at 124 Halsey Street, Monmouth Conference Room, 7th floor, on March 23, 2016 at 9:00 a.m. All members were duly notified of the time, place and all pertinent materials were provided to the members.

IV. UPDATES BY EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The Executive Director reported for the month of February, \$94,371 was collected in fines and penalties. The following permits, licenses, and registrations were issued during

the month:

2) Radia Hill-Owens – Pharmacy Technician, finalize POD

Ms. Hill-Owens responded to the Board’s request for additional information following her receipt of the Provisional Order of Discipline, filed on November 30, 2016

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Stephen Lieberman, to approve the Final Order of Discipline, withdrawing the suspension of her registration, but imposing the \$250 fine. **Motion carried 6-0.**

3) Kyle Colallilo, R.Ph. – Request for unrestricted license

Item tabled.

4) John Hollis Pharmacy, Nashville, TN – Out-of-state pharmacy application

It was determined, at the November 18, 2015 meeting, that the Pharmacy’s hours of operation did not meet the minimum requirements for licensure. The application was subsequently denied. The pharmacy has since submitted documentation indicating that they meet the Boards regulatory requirements for hours of operation.

Stephen Lieberman moved, seconded by Mahesh Shah, to ratify Thomas Bender’s decision, made between Board meeting dates, to approve this application. **Motion carried 6-0.**

VI. NEW BUSINESS

1) Bill A3281

This bill would criminalize the manufacture, possession and sale of products containing kratom (mitragyna speciosa korth), a botanical substance that grows naturally in Southeast Asia. Kratom is frequently marketed on the Internet for its psychoactive and opioid-like analgesic effects, and for use in the treatment of morphine and heroin addiction. However, kratom is not approved in the United States for any medical use.

Richard Palombo moved, seconded by Mitch Sobel, to support this bill and recommended scheduling Kratom as a schedule I substance. **Motion carried 6-0.**

2) Bill A837

This bill establishes the “Hazardous Drug Safe Handling Act,” which would require the Commissioner of Labor and Workforce Development (“commissioner”) to promulgate rules and regulations concerning the handling of hazardous drugs by health care personnel.

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Thomas Bender to oppose this bill. The Board is supportive of public safety, but this bill does not itemize any deficiencies related to current pharmacy practice. This bill does not bring anything new to the table related to closed system transfer devices and related technologies. **Motion carried 6-0.**

3) Bill S1772 – Permits pharmacists to dispense certain drugs in emergency without prescription

This bill permits a pharmacist to dispense or sell an emergency supply of a chronic maintenance drug without a current, valid prescription from a practitioner, under certain conditions.

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Mitch Sobel to support this bill as it enables the pharmacist to use professional judgment and training. **Motion carried 6-0.**

4) Bill A3434 – Permits abandoned prescription medication to be re-dispensed up to one year after original preparation

This bill would provide that, in the event that a pharmacy prepares a prescription medication that is abandoned by a patient, or a long-term care pharmacy does not dispense a prescription medication to a patient in a long-term care facility, the medication would be held for re-dispensing and used as soon as possible. The medication would not be dispensed to patients later than one year from the date the medication was originally prepared for dispensing. A re-dispensed medication would be marked with the same use-by date found on the medication when it was originally prepared for dispensing.

Stephen Lieberman moved, seconded by Richard Palombo to support the bill, provided the language, such as “abandoned”, is clarified and pharmacists are able to maintain the protections associated with N.J.A.C.13:39-7.16, allowing professional judgement, and ensuring drug integrity. **Motion carried 6-0.**

5) **Bill A3453** – Requires all public bodies to allow public comment at every meeting

This bill amends the "Open Public Meetings Act," N.J.S.A.10:4-6 et seq., to require all public bodies, other than the Legislature, to set aside a portion of every meeting for public comment on any governmental issue that a member of the public feels may be of concern to that public body. At present, the law only requires municipal governing bodies and boards of education to provide a public comment period. Expanding this policy will increase public interest and participation in civic affairs.

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Mahesh Shah to support this bill. **Motion carried 6-0.**

6) **Bill S1909** – Requires persons and entities to report to DHS regarding their distribution or administration of opioid antidotes, and requires DHS to provide aggregate data to Governor, Legislature, and public.

This bill would require the reporting of certain information to the Department of Human Services (DHS) in relation to the administration and dispensation of opioid antidotes, and would require the DHS to: (1) submit a report to the Governor and Legislature to provide aggregate statistics related to the dispensation of opioid antidotes in the State; and (2) establish a publicly-accessible electronic database of aggregate information related to the administration of opioid antidotes in the State. In particular, the bill would specify that each entity, pharmacist, or other person that sells or dispenses an opioid antidote, at retail, in a form that provides the means to directly administer the opioid antidote to a person experiencing an opioid overdose, will be required, on or before the 15th day of each month, to report to the DHS, the total number of doses of opioid antidotes that have been sold or dispensed during the previous month.

Mitch Sobel moved, seconded by Mahesh Shah to oppose this bill because the burdens imposed is on the listed entities to record all data, which concerns the Board that it may interfere with dispensing. This may be a deterrent to the original intent of the NARCAN bill to assist the public. **Motion carried 6-0.**

7) **Festus Nwanko, R.Ph.** – Pharmacist reinstatement application

The Board received and reviewed a request from Angelo Cifaldi, Esq., on behalf of Festus Nwanko, requesting the reinstatement of his pharmacist license. Mr. Nwanko has not practiced since 1993 and ultimately surrendered his license, by way of Consent Order, filed on October 25, 1996. The Consent Order was predicated on a criminal case and guilty plea following Medicaid fraud in excess of \$5,000,000 and tax evasion.

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Thomas Bender, that based on the

egregiousness of the behavior at the time, which involved the practice of pharmacy, the Board will not consider him as a candidate to apply for the property right of a license. The recommendations provided on behalf of the applicant were personal, not professional, and don't address his previous conduct. **Motion carried 5-0-1.** Mahesh Shah was recused due to his affiliation with Angelo Cifaldi.

8) Sean Watson, R.Ph. – Pharmacist reinstatement application

The Board received and reviewed a request from Angelo Cifaldi, Esq., on behalf of Sean Watson, requesting the reinstatement of his pharmacist license. Mr. Watson voluntarily surrendered his license, by way of Consent Order, dated July 23, 2014 after he was allegedly working as the pharmacist in charge, while intoxicated and may have been diverting controlled dangerous substances for his own use.

Richard Palombo moved, seconded by Stephen Lieberman, to schedule Mr. Watson for an investigative inquiry. **Motion carried 5-0-1. Mahesh Shah was recused due to his affiliation with Angelo Cifaldi.**

9) Sharleen Iyahan, PharmD – Pharmacist by reciprocity application

The Board received and reviewed Ms. Iyahan's application for a pharmacist license via reciprocity. Ms. Iyahan has not practiced pharmacy since 2011.

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Richard Palombo, to direct Ms. Iyahan to apply via examination, which will include serving an internship, unless additional information is submitted which warrants Board review. **Motion carried 6-0.**

10) Maged Messeha – Request to accept low TOEFL score

Mr. Messah contacted the Board office, requesting approval to proceed with an internship application as a foreign graduate, with a low TOEFL score. In his request, Mr. Messeha detailed two technical complications while taking the exam, which was confirmed by an incident report from the proctor, Educational Testing Service.

Stephen Lieberman moved, seconded by Edward McGinley to accept the score based on the overall test scores and documented technical issues reported by the testing facility. Mr. Messeha should be aware that this may affect his ability to reciprocate to other states and he should contact NABP to determine if he should be licensed with the waiver, or if he should retake the test, attempting to pass all components. **Motion carried 6-0.**

11) Mariana Cerrelin – Request to accept intern hours earned in New York

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Mahesh Shah to accept the 2,128 hours earned out-of-state towards the New Jersey internship requirements. **Motion carried 6-0.**

12) Anne Pieters - Request to accept intern hours earned in Pennsylvania

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Rich Palombo to accept the 2,120 hours earned out-of-state towards the New Jersey internship requirements. **Motion carried 6-0.**

13) Out of State Pharmacy Applications – Sterile compounding

a. Option Care, Plymouth Meeting, PA

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Rich Palombo to approve this application. **Motion carried 5-0-1.** Thomas Bender was recused due to his affiliation with Walgreens.

b. Option Care, Lombard, IL

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Mahesh Shah to approve this application. **Motion carried 5-0-1.** Thomas Bender was recused due to his affiliation with Walgreens.

c. Option Care, Newark, DE

Richard Palombo moved, seconded by Stephen Lieberman to grant the name change, but remind the pharmacy that renewals are coming up and a more recent inspection report will be required. **Motion carried 5-0-1.** Thomas Bender was recused due to his affiliation with Walgreens.

d. Option Care, Bethlehem, PA

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Mahesh Shah to approve this application. **Motion carried 5-0-1.** Thomas Bender was recused due to his affiliation with Walgreens.

e. Infucare RX, Aston, PA

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Richard Palombo to request a VPP or 3rd party inspection report under dynamic conditions. The application will pend until receipt and review of the requested report. **Motion carried 5-0-1.** Mitch Sobel was out of the room.

f. Kaba Fusion, Inc., Shrewsbury, MA

Thomas Bender moved, seconded by Richard Palombo to allow the application to pend until the pharmacy submits policies and procedures reflecting the pharmacy's current name, removing all references to the former pharmacy, as well as an updated inspection report. **Motion carried 6-0.**

g. Axelacare Healthcare Solutions, Havertown, PA

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Thomas Bender to allow application to pend until the receipt and review of a VPP inspection and ask the pharmacy to correct the application to reveal the name change. **Motion carried 6-0.**

14) Out of State Pharmacy Application – With Discipline

a. Alliance Allergy Solutions, Birmingham, AL

Alliance Allergy Solutions entered into a Consent Order in December of 2015 with the Alabama Board of Pharmacy following a number of USP 795

violations.

Edward McGinley moved to deny the application based on the issues outlined in previous discipline report. Motion withdrawn by Edward McGinley.

Richard Palombo moved, seconded by Mahesh Shah, to approve the application because the pharmacy is in good standing and they offer non-sterile compounding. Motion withdrawn by Richard Palombo.

Thomas Bender moved, seconded by Mitch Sobel, to allow the application to pend until the receipt of the most recent inspection report. **Motion carried 6-0.**

b. Sobe Compounding Apothecary d/b/a Budget Drugs – Budget Discount Sales, Miami, FL

Sobe Compounding Apothecary d/b/a Budget Drugs entered into a Consent Order in 1998 with the Florida Department of Health following an audit, which revealed they failed to provide adequate documentation for drugs billed to Medicaid, resulting in an overpayment of \$5,950.79.

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Stephen Lieberman, to approve this application. **Motion carried 6-0.**

c. Concierge Compounding Pharmaceuticals, Inc., Henderson NV

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Thomas bender, to allow this application to pend until we have a clearer understanding of who the parties in the current ownership are, to ensure we don't have any previous owners still in place. If the information received is clear, allow the Executive Director to proceed with the application. **Motion carried 5-0-1. Mitch Sobel was opposed.**

d. AnazaoHealth, Las Vegas, NV - sterile compounding

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Stephen Lieberman, to approve this application. Motion withdrawn.

Thomas Bender moved, seconded by Rich Palombo to pend application until the Board receives a response to an outstanding FDA 483 warning letter, and an accurate description of the change of ownership. **Motion carried 6-0.**

15) Selection of Delegates for the NABP 112th Annual Meeting

NABP's 112th Annual Meeting will be held May 14-17, 2016 in San Diego, CA.

Thomas Bender moved, seconded by Richard Palombo, to nominate Mahesh Shah as the Board's delegate for the NABP 112th annual meeting. **Motion carried 6-0.**

Thomas Bender was selected as an alternate.

16) Citizens Specialty, Inc. – New pharmacy application, waiver request for store and PIC hours

The Board received a request from Pam Mandel, Esq., on behalf of Citizens Specialty, seeking a temporary waiver to allow the pharmacy to be open only 20 hours a week and allow the pharmacist in charge to work only 20 hours a week, until the store obtains its URAC accreditation.

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Thomas Bender, to grant the waiver for one year or until the URAC accreditation, whichever is shorter. If an extension is needed, the pharmacy will need to submit a written request to the Board. **Motion carried 6-0.**

17) TMS Health Patient Access Solutions, LLC – Transfer of ownership application – request for transfer of waivers

At the November 13, 2013 Board meeting, the Board reviewed and approved InVentiv Patient Access Solutions Pharmacy request to waive the following requirements, contingent on inVentiv submitting a signed affidavit to the Board attesting that no drugs will be stored or dispensed at this location:

- 1- Posted signs on the exterior of the building.
- 2- Prescription Area sink.
- 3- Prescription Counter.
- 4- Spatial requirement of pharmacy prescription area.
- 5- Prescription Counter.
- 6- Adequate Storage requirement for prescription drugs.
- 7- Over the counter schedule V record book.
- 8- Storage space for schedule II substances.
- 9- Volumetric device.
- 10- Steel Spatula and rubber spatula.
- 11- Counting trays and counting devices.
- 12- Labels
- 13- Auxiliary labels
- 14- DUR council placards.
- 15- Prescription containers and child safety closures.
- 16- Class A prescription balance
- 17- Glass mortar and pestle
- 18- Glass funnels
- 19- Ointment tile or parchment paper
- 20- Suppository mold
- 21- Monitored Security System
- 22- Patient's signature forms for accepting/declining offer for dispensing counseling.

When submitting the change of ownership application to the Board, the pharmacy requested the waivers be transferred to the new ownership.

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Richard Palombo, to approve the transfer of the waivers to the new owners. **Motion carried 6-0.**

Kathryn Sanders and Khanh Hodoan, RPIC, responded on behalf of CVS Pharmacy and requested mitigation of N.J.A.C. 13:45H-5.7.

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Richard Palombo to remove N.J.A.C. 13:45H-5.7, and send the response to both Kathryn Sanders and Khanh Hodoan since Ms. Sanders is no longer working at CVS. **Motion carried 6-0.**

2) Jennifer Lebak, RPIC - Walgreens #5987, Willingboro, NJ

Jennifer Lebak, RPIC, responded on behalf of Walgreens and requested mitigation of N.J.A.C. 13:39-6.2(d).

Stephen Lieberman moved, seconded by Mahesh Shah to remove N.J.A.C. 13:39-6.2(d). **Motion carried 5-0-1.** Thomas Bender was recused due to his affiliation with Walgreens.

3) Pratik Patel, RPIC - La Nueva Mercedes Pharmacy Department, Paterson, NJ

Blanca Gonzalez, Office Manager, responded on behalf of La Nueva Mercedes Pharmacy Department and requested mitigation of N.J.A.C. 13:39-6.2(d), N.J.A.C.13:45H-5.5(a), N.J.A.C.13:39-4.15(c)1, N.J.A.C.13:39-4.15(c)2.

Stephen Lieberman moved, seconded by Mahesh Shah to remove N.J.A.C.13:39-4.15(c)1. The pharmacy must complete and check the correct box on the certification page. **Motion carried 6-0.**

4) Peter Herina, RPIC - Shippee's Pharmacy, Wanaque, NJ

Peter Herina, RPIC, responded on behalf of Shippee's Pharmacy and requested mitigation of N.J.A.C.45:1-45B.

Stephen Lieberman moved, seconded by Richard Palombo to remove N.J.A.C.45:1-45B. **Motion carried 6-0.**

5) Gabriel Meister, RPIC - CVS Pharmacy, Haddonfield, NJ

Gabriel Meister, responded on behalf of CVS Pharmacy and requested mitigation of N.J.A.C. 13:39-4.15(c)4, N.J.A.C.13:39-6.10(a)(b), N.J.A.C.13:39-6.2(d).

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Stephen Lieberman to deny the request as all actions taken were corrective in nature. **Motion carried 6-0.**

6) Amit Patel, RPIC - Colts Neck Pharmacy, Colts Neck, NJ

Amit Patel, RPIC, responded on behalf of Colts Neck Pharmacy and requested mitigation of N.J.A.C.13:39-4.3 and N.J.A.C.13:39-5.8(a)1.

Stephen Lieberman moved, seconded by Mahesh Shah to mitigate N.J.A.C.13:39-4.3 to a warning and remove N.J.A.C.13:39-5.8(a)1. **Motion carried 5-0-1.** Edward McGinley was recused as Mr. Patel was a former employee.

7) Joseph Kubulak, RPIC - Specialty Rx Inc. Pharmacy, Roselle, NJ

Pam Mandel, Esq., responded on behalf of Specialty Rx Inc. Pharmacy and requested mitigation of N.J.A.C.13:39-11.23(b), N.J.A.C.13:39-11.24(a)3, and N.J.A.C.13:39-11.20(c).

Thomas Bender moved, seconded by Mitch Sobel to mitigate N.J.A.C.13:39-11.23(b) to \$100, deny mitigation of N.J.A.C.13:39-11.24(a)3, and mitigate N.J.A.C.13:39-11.20(c) to \$1,000. **Motion carried 6-0.**

8) Teodoro Figuero Santa Cruz, RPIC - Metro Pharmacy, Newark, NJ

Angelo Cifaldi, Esq., responded on behalf of Metro Pharmacy and requested mitigation of one of the duplicate N.J.A.C. 13:39-7.16(c) citations and N.J.A.C.13:39-6.15(d)(e).

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Stephen Lieberman to remove of one of the duplicate N.J.A.C. 13:39-7.16(c) citations and N.J.A.C.13:39-6.15(d)(e). **Motion carried 5-0-1.** Mahesh Shah was recused due to his affiliation with Angelo Cifaldi.

9) Pina Patel, RPIC - Washington Shop Pharmacy, East Orange, NJ

Pina Patel, RPIC, responded on behalf of Washington Shop Pharmacy and requested mitigation of N.J.A.C.13:39-4.15(b)1.

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Stephen Lieberman to mitigate N.J.A.C.13:39-4.15(b)1 to a warning.. **Motion carried 6-0.**

10) Yvette Petion, RPIC – CVS #245, Clifton, NJ

Yvette Petion, RPIC, responded on behalf of CVS and requested mitigation of 21CFR1301.11 and 21CFR1301.12.

Edward McGinley moved, seconded by Stephen Lieberman to remove 21CFR1301.11 and 21CFR1301.12. This citation should be referred to the rules and regulations committee for further review. **Motion carried 6-0.**

11) Glenn Sudnick, RPIC – Quakerbridge Pharmacy, Mercerville, NJ

Glenn Sudnick, RPIC, responded on behalf of Quakerbridge Pharmacy and requested mitigation of N.J.A.C.13:39-11A.9(1), N.J.A.C.13:39-11A.9(g), and N.J.A.C.13:39-11A.11(b).

Richard Palombo moved, seconded by Edward McGinley to deny mitigation.
Motion carried 6-0.

VIII. INFORMATIONAL

1) NAPLEX Program Notification

The National Association of Boards of Pharmacy notified the boards of pharmacy regarding changes to the NAPLEX, that will go into effect on November 1, 2016.

- The number of examination items will increase from 185 to 250. Of the 250 delivered questions, 200 are operational and will be used to calculate a score for the NAPLEX. The remaining 50 will be non-scored or pretest items.
- The testing time for the examination will increase from four hours and fifteen minutes to six hours. The appointment time with the vendor, Pearson VUE, will be six and a half hours to allow for time to read and agree to the confidentiality/non-disclosure agreement, and to take the tutorial and post-exam survey.
- The registration fee will increase from \$505 to \$575 to account for the additional seat time.
- The examination assembly format will change from a computer adaptive exam (test assembled as candidate is taking the exam) to a linear form exam (pre-assembled exam form).

2) Emergency Contraception Guide for Pharmacist

Accepted as informational.

3) MA Board of Pharmacy- New Opioid Legislation

Effective March 14, 2016, Massachusetts law establishes a maximum seven day supply on prescriptions for opioids when issued to an adult for the first time. The law also sets a maximum seven day supply on all opioid prescriptions for minors.

A prescriber may issue a prescription for more than a seven day supply of an opioid to adult or minor patients if, in the prescriber's medical judgment, a greater supply is necessary to treat an acute medical condition, chronic pain, pain associated with a cancer diagnosis or for palliative care. In such a case, the condition must be documented in the patient's medical record and the prescriber must indicate that a non-opioid alternative was not appropriate to address the medical condition.

This new law does not apply to opioid medications that are designed for the treatment of substance abuse or opioid dependence.

Massachusetts law enables patients to direct pharmacies to dispense less than the fully prescribed quantity of an opioid. If dispensed in this manner, the prescription is void as to any quantity not dispensed.

4) New York Mandatory Electronic Prescribing

Effective March 27, 2016, New York will implement mandatory electronic prescribing, which is an amendment to the Public Health Law and Education Law. The law offers exceptions, including prescriptions issued by a practitioner to be dispensed by a pharmacy located outside of New York. IX. COMMITTEE REPORTS

1) NABP MPJE Item Development Workshop

The National Association of Boards of Pharmacy (NABP) hosted the Multistate Pharmacy Jurisprudence Examination (MPJE) Item Development Workshop on March 15-16, 2016, at NABP Headquarters in Mount Prospect, IL. Thomas Bender participated in the two-day workshop. The MPJE was deficient in PMP questions. 30 new questions were developed related to the PMP and hazardous drugs.

2) Rules and Regulations
