

**NEW JERSEY STATE BOARD OF PHYSICAL THERAPY EXAMINERS**  
**PUBLIC SESSION MINUTES**  
**November 27, 2007**

A regular meeting of the New Jersey State Board of Physical Therapy Examiners was held at 124 Halsey Street, Newark, New Jersey, in the Somerset Conference Room, 6th Floor, on Tuesday November 27, 2007. The meeting was convened in accordance with the provisions of the Open Public Meetings Act. Nancy Kirsch, Chairperson of the Board, called the meeting to order at 9:30 A.M. and a roll call was taken and the following attendance was recorded:

**I. APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF OCTOBER 23, 2007 BOARD MEETING**

Upon a motion made by Barbara J. Behrens and seconded by Mary Browne, the Board voted to accept the minutes of the October 23, 2007 Board meeting as amended. A vote was taken and the motion carried by a unanimous vote.

**II. ELECTIONS OF OFFICERS FOR 2008**

Deputy Attorney General, Carmen Rodriguez, took the chair to conduct the election of Board Officers for 2008.

D.A.G. Rodriguez called for nominations for Chairperson and a motion was made by Mary Browne and seconded by Dennise Krencicki to nominate Nancy Kirsch for Chairperson of the Board for 2008. D.A.G. Rodriguez called for further nominations and there were none. Barbara J. Behrens then made a motion, seconded by Cindy Moore to close the nominations and elect Nancy Kirsch Chairperson of the Board by acclamation. The vote of the Board was unanimous.

D.A.G. Rodriguez called for nominations for Vice Chairperson and a motion was made by Barbara J. Behrens and seconded by Dennise Krencicki to nominate Mary Browne for Vice Chairperson of the Board for 2008. D.A.G. Rodriguez called for further nominations and there were none. Cindy Moore then made a motion, seconded by Jean Bickal to close the nominations and elect Mary Browne Vice Chairperson by acclamation. The vote of the Board was unanimous.

D.A.G. Rodriguez called for nominations for Secretary and a motion was made by Carolanne Aaron and seconded by Mary Browne to nominate Karen Wilk for Secretary of the Board for 2008. D.A.G. Rodriguez called for further nominations and there were none. Jean Bickal then made a motion, seconded by Cindy Moore to close the nominations and elect Karen Wilk Secretary of the Board by acclamation. The vote of the Board was unanimous.

**III. NEW BUSINESS**

A. Assembly, No. 4455

(Synopsis - Provides for licensure of massage and bodywork therapists and registration of their employees) -  
Introduced November 8, 2007

A motion was made by Cindy Moore and seconded by Mary Browne to advise the Division of Consumer Affairs legislative liaison that the Board of Physical Therapy Examiners opposes this bill.

The Board will submit the following comment: The bill would change the regulation of massage therapy from certification to licensure. The Board believes that this may mislead the public to expect a level of expertise which is inconsistent with the academic preparation of a massage therapist. This is of particular concern as this bill establishes an independent Board of Massage and Bodywork and will remove the oversight of the practice of massage therapists by an established, trained health care profession, as now occurs through the Board of Nursing. It would also, as licensed health providers, allow them to be hired by other health care practitioners to provide patient treatment for which they have no preparation. This is of significant concern for the welfare of individuals with pathology who may be treated by a massage therapist who is not qualified to manage their care.

The bill broadens the scope of practice of massage therapists to now include the treatment of illness, disease, impairment or disability. However, the training to prepare practitioners to engage in these activities has not changed and it does not support their transition to this expanded scope of practice. The bill allows for licensure as a massage and bodywork therapist via several entry routes, either through 500 hours of class study or by passing a written examination. The bill does not establish a consistent, required educational program for practice and no entry route contains provisions to certify competency in the practical application of massage therapy techniques. Additionally, the minimum of 500 hours of training is equivalent to approximately one semester of full time academic instruction. This educational curriculum cannot in this time period provide the needed instruction in anatomy, physiology and pathology, in addition to massage techniques, that would be required to treat persons with illness, disease, impairment and disability. Massage therapists are unable to diagnose, which is a prerequisite to treatment. In addition the bill does not require any accreditation process for the educational programs. This is of concern as this bill allows consumers to directly access massage therapy services, placing consumers at risk for inappropriate, unnecessary or potentially harmful treatment.

The Board is also concerned with the impact of this bill on the current established practice of Physical Therapy. Massage is an identified intervention used by physical therapists and recognized in our practice act. However, this bill would prevent physical therapists from advertising that they perform massage unless the employer is registered with the state, which constitutes an unacceptable restriction to our current practice.

A vote was taken and the motion carried by a unanimous vote.

B. Letter from Judy Oiler, Executive Director of the American Physical Therapy Association of New Jersey RE:  
Continuing Education

Ms. Oiler advised the Board that the Federation of State Boards of Physical Therapy's webpage [www.fsbpt.org/publications/continuingcompetency](http://www.fsbpt.org/publications/continuingcompetency) contains incorrect information as it indicates that New Jersey does not require completion of continuing education for physical therapists or physical therapist assistants license renewal.

The Board will advise the Federation of State Boards of Physical Therapy that New Jersey has a continuing education requirement for licensure renewal. In accordance with N.J.A.C. 13:39A-9.2, "each applicant for biennial license renewal as a licensed physical therapist or as a licensed physical therapist assistant shall complete during the preceding biennial period a minimum of 30 credits of continuing education".

C. Letter from Carol M. Mangini, PT, from the American Physical Therapy Association of New Jersey RE:  
Continuing Education Courses

Ms. Mangini asked the Board for clarification concerning matters related to continuing education, specifically the continuing education audit process and the approval of continuing education courses.

The Board will advise Ms. Mangini that pursuant to N.J.A.C. 13:39A-9.4(d) the Board will conduct a random audit of licensees, who upon request, shall provide proof of successful completion of continuing education credits. Licensees should only provide proof of completion of their continuing education credits to the Board if they are notified in writing that they have been selected to participate in the continuing education audit.

The Board will also advise Ms. Mangini that it will continue to automatically accept credits awarded from courses given by APTA and APTA-NJ. The Board will conduct a random audit of courses given by APTA and APTA-NJ to ensure that the courses continue to meet the requirements set forth in N.J.A.C. 13:39A-9 et seq. The Board will advise Ms. Mangini that the proof of attendance provided to licensees who attend APTA-NJ courses should include as an identifier the abbreviation "APTA-NJ" as well as the year the course was given. For example "APTA-NJ 2007".

The Board will advise Ms. Mangini that courses in jurisprudence must be courses on the New Jersey Physical Therapy Practice Act and presented by a lecturer that is proficient in the New Jersey Physical Therapy Practice Act.

The Board will further advise Ms. Mangini that pursuant to N.J.A.C. 13:39A-9.3( c) a licensee can only receive two credits per home study or internet course.

D. Letter from Patricia Deotte, PT  
RE: Continuing Education

Ms. Deotte inquired what the ramifications would be for licensees who are selected to participate in the continuing education audit and have not met the continuing education requirement. Ms. Deotte also asked the Board to define acceptable jurisprudence courses.

The Board will advise Ms. Deotte that each licensee shall attest on their biennial renewal as to whether or not he or she has completed the continuing education requirement. The biennial renewal will include the question, "Will you have completed the required continuing education credits by January 31, 2008". Licensees who do not meet the continuing education requirement or do not answer the above mentioned question honestly on their renewal application will be subject to disciplinary action.

The Board will also advise Ms. Deotte that courses in jurisprudence must be courses on the New Jersey Physical Therapy Practice Act and presented by a lecturer that is proficient in the New Jersey Physical Therapy Practice Act.

E. Letter from Naomi Lei Masgaser  
RE: Licensure

Ms. Masgaser meets the licensing requirements for a physical therapist with the exception of passing the National Physical Therapist Examination. Ms. Masgaser advised the Board that although she took and passed the National Physical Therapist Assistant Examination, she was informed that she could not apply for licensure as a physical therapist assistant.

A motion was made by Mary Browne and seconded by Jean Bickal to advise Ms. Masgaser that she cannot be licensed as a physical therapist assistant as she is educated as a physical therapist and does not meet the requirements for licensure as a physical therapist assistant, specifically N.J.A.C. 13:39A-5.2(a) 4. A vote was taken and the motion carried by a unanimous vote.

F. Letter from John Lugo, PT  
RE: Nerve Conduction Velocity Studies

Mr. Lugo wrote the Board concerning its response to Tiffany Spadafora's inquiry concerning nerve conductive velocity (NCV). The Board advised Ms. Spadafora that a physical therapist is not permitted to perform NCV

pursuant to the New Jersey State Board of Medical Examiners regulation N.J.A.C. 13:35-2.6(c)1.

Mr. Lugo advised that the Board informed him previously that a New Jersey licensed physical therapist is not precluded from performing surface nerve conduction studies as it is part of their educational background.

Mr. Lugo also inquired whether a physical therapist could bill under specific Current Procedural Terminology (CPT) codes for surface nerve conduction studies.

The Board will advise Mr. Lugo that he received a different response than Ms. Spadafora because his inquiry concerned surface nerve conductive studies which is not an invasive procedure. Ms. Spadafora's inquiry concerned a physical therapist performing a nerve conductive velocity test which is invasive and not permitted to be performed by a physical therapist pursuant to N.J.A.C. 13:35-2.6(c)1 which is prohibited by a regulation of the Board of Medical Examiners. The Board will also advise Mr. Lugo that it is not within the Board's jurisdiction to make determinations concerning the use of specific CPT codes for billing purposes.

G. Letter from Tiffany Spadafora, PT  
RE: Surface Nerve Conduction Studies

Ms. Spadafora inquired whether a physical therapist can bill for surface nerve conduction studies. Ms. Spadafora inquired whether a physical therapist can perform surface nerve conduction studies under the direct supervision of a qualified medical professional. Ms. Spadafora also inquired whether a physical therapist could bill under specific Current Procedural Terminology (CPT) codes for surface nerve conduction studies.

The Board will advise Ms. Spadafora that a physical therapist can bill for surface nerve conduction studies if they perform the procedure. The Board will advise Ms. Spadafora that a physical therapist can perform surface nerve conduction studies without the supervision of a medical professional. The Board will also advise Ms. Spadafora that it is not within the Board's jurisdiction to make determinations concerning the use of specific CPT codes for billing purposes which is within the professional judgment of the physical therapist.

H. Letter from Frank J. Scerbo, PT  
RE: New Jersey State Board of Physical Therapy Examiners  
September 26, 2006 Public Session Minutes

Mr. Scerbo wrote the Board concerning the Board's comment to the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners Proposed Readoption with Amendments in the New Jersey State Board of Physical Therapy Examiners' September 26, 2006 Public Session Minutes. The Board refers to a court case but does not identify the case. Mr. Scerbo asked the Board to provide him with the name of the court case.

D.A.G. Rodriguez will retrieve the name of the court case and the Board will provide Mr. Scerbo with the information.

I. Letter from Christine Waldron, PT  
RE: Continuing Education

Ms. Waldron wrote the Board requesting a waiver of the continuing education requirement for this renewal due to her medical condition. Ms. Waldron advised the Board that she obtained 24.5 continuing education credits and is currently on disability.

A motion was made by Karen Wilk and seconded by Jean Bickal to advise Ms. Waldron that she can take internet or home study courses to meet the continuing education requirement by January 31, 2008. A vote was taken and the motion carried by a unanimous vote.

J. Letter from Astaire Villanueva, PT  
RE: Re-evaluation

Mr. Villanueva inquired whether there is a specific time line as to when a physical therapy re-evaluation must be performed. Mr. Villanueva also inquired whether a re-evaluation is sufficient enough to perform when a patient returns for physical therapy for the same diagnosis and the same body part after more than 30 days of absence or is another initial evaluation required.

A motion was made by Dennise Krencicki and seconded by Carolanne Aaron to advise Mr. Villanueva that the New Jersey State Board of Physical Therapy Examiners' statutes and regulations do not address timeframes in which a re-evaluation should be performed. Based on the patient's plan of care it is within the professional judgement of the physical therapist to determine when a re-evaluation should be performed. The Board will also advise Mr. Villanueva that another initial evaluation must be performed if the patient was discharged from care and returns for physical therapy treatment. A vote was taken and the motion carried by a unanimous vote.

K. Letter from Marda Herz, PT  
RE: Evaluation

Ms. Herz advised the Board that the Newark Board of Education changed their evaluation models related to the Individual Education Plan (IEP) by removing the recommendation section as well as the goal and objective statements. Ms. Herz further advised that the recommendations, goals, and objectives now appear only on the Present Levels of Academic Achievement and Functional Performance (PLAAFP) which accompany each evaluation when presented back to the Child Study Team. Ms. Herz asked the Board whether this change was in compliance with the New Jersey Physical Therapy Practice Act.

A motion was made by Karen Wilk and seconded by Barbara J. Behrens to advise Ms. Herz that each group can have their own forms as long as the information when combined is in compliance with the requirements in the New Jersey Physical Therapy Practice Act. A vote was taken and the motion carried by a unanimous vote.

L. Letter from Renee Fishweicher, PT  
RE: Continuing Education

Ms. Fishweicher advised the Board that she cannot attend continuing education courses on Saturdays due to her religion. Ms. Fishweicher also advised the Board that she was interested in a course that was being offered on a weekday, but discovered that it was denied by the Board.

A motion was made by Jean Bickal and seconded by Cindy Moore to advise Ms. Fishweicher that there are continuing education courses that are offered on weekdays as well as on Sundays. The Board will also advise that licensees can obtain 10 continuing education credits from internet or home study courses. The Board will further advise that continuing education sponsors who have had courses denied are afforded the opportunity to meet the requirements set forth in N.J.A.C. 13:39A-9 et seq. A vote was taken and the motion carried by a unanimous vote.

M. Letter form Kristine Coniglio, PT  
RE: Reinstatement Fee

Ms. Coniglio advised the Board that she submitted an address change in April of 2005. Ms. Coniglio also advised that she did not receive a renewal notice for the 2006-2008 renewal period. Ms. Coniglio informed the Board that she discovered that two numbers in her zip code were reversed although she did provide the Board office with the correct zip code. Ms. Coniglio inquired whether the Board would consider waiving the \$200.00 reinstatement fee due to the typographical error.

A motion was made by Cindy Moore and seconded by Jean Bickal to grant Ms. Coniglio's request and waive the \$200.00 reinstatement fee due to the typographical error. A vote was taken and the motion carried by a unanimous vote.

N. Letter from Lisa Aichele  
RE: Application for physical therapist assistant license

A motion was made by Barbara J. Behrens and seconded by Carolanne Aaron to contact the Federation of State Boards of Physical Therapy (FSBPT) concerning what the passing scores were in 1984 for the physical therapist assistant examination. Ms. Aichele will need to take the physical therapist assistant examination again if the information from the FSBPT discloses that her scores were not passing in 1984. A vote was taken and the motion carried by a unanimous vote.

#### O. Continuing Education Credits License Reinstatement and Activation

A licensee reinstating or activating their physical therapy or physical therapist assistant license must provide 30 continuing education credits taken within two years immediately preceding reinstatement or activation.

Licenses that are reinstated or activated during the timeframe of November 1, 2007 through January 31, 2008 will be renewed until January 31, 2010.

A motion was made by Jean Bickal and seconded by Barbara J. Behrens to audit the continuing education credits of licensees who have been reinstated or activated during the timeframe of November 1, 2007 through January 31, 2008 as the completion of 30 continuing education credits is required by N.J.A.C. 13:39A-5A3( c) for reinstatement and N.J.A.C. 13:39A-5A.2(b) for activation. A vote was taken and the motion carried by a unanimous vote.

#### P. Letter from Christine Osman, PT RE: Continuing Education

Ms. Osman wrote the Board concerning whether she can receive continuing education credits from a residency program approved by the American Physical Therapy Association (APTA).

A motion was made by Mary Browne and seconded by Jean Bickal to advise Ms. Osman that pursuant to N.J.A.C. 13:39A-9.3(e), "A licensed physical therapist who successfully completes a residency approved by the American Physical Therapy Association (APTA) shall receive 15 continuing education credits for the biennial licensure period in which the residency takes place". A vote was taken and the motion carried by a unanimous vote.

### **IV. OLD BUSINESS**

#### A. Response from Jessica M. Martinez, PT RE: Continuing Education

Ms. Martinez wrote the Board requesting a waiver of the continuing education requirement for this renewal due to her husband's medical condition.

Ms. Martinez provided the Board with a letter from her husband's treating physician of the background and status of his medical condition. Ms. Martinez also provided the Board with the name and location of where she practices and/or practiced physical therapy during the time frame of February 1, 2006 through the present. Ms. Martinez further provided the Board with a statement concerning the amount of time she practices and/or practiced physical therapy during the time frame of February 1, 2006 through the present including how many hours she practices and/or practiced in a day and how many days a week she practices and/or practiced. Ms. Martinez also advised the Board that she obtained 11 continuing education credits towards the required 30 credits.

A motion was made by Barbara J. Behrens and seconded by Karen Wilk to grant Ms. Martinez an extension to April 1, 2008 to complete the remaining 19 continuing education credits. The Board will also permit Ms. Martinez to obtain the remaining 19 credits from internet or home study courses due to her documented circumstances. The Board will remind Ms. Martinez that these continuing education credits cannot be used to renew her license in 2010. A vote was taken and the motion carried by a unanimous vote.

B. Response from Stacey Goller, PT  
RE: Continuing Education

Ms. Goller wrote the Board requesting a waiver of the continuing education requirement for this renewal due to her medical condition.

Ms. Goller provided the Board with the number of continuing education credits she obtained from February 1, 2006 through the present. Ms. Goller provided the Board with a letter from her treating physician of the background and status of her medical condition. Ms. Goller also provided the name and location of where she practices and/or practiced physical therapy during the time frame of February 1, 2006 through the present. Ms. Goller provided a statement concerning the amount of time she practices and/or practiced physical therapy during the time frame of February 1, 2006 through the present including how many hours she practices and/or practiced in a day and how many days a week she practices and/or practiced.

A motion was made by Jean Bickal and seconded by Cindy Moore to grant Ms. Goller an extension to April 1, 2008 to complete the required 30 continuing education credits. The Board will permit Ms. Goller to obtain all 30 continuing education credits from internet or home study courses due to her documented circumstances. The Board will remind Ms. Goller that these continuing education credits cannot be used to renew her license in 2010. A vote was taken and the motion carried by a unanimous vote.

C. Board Discussion with Charles Manning, Regulatory Analyst  
RE: Regulations  
- Advertising

Charles Manning, Regulatory Analyst, met with the Board regarding additional draft language for N.J.A.C. 13:39A-8.1 Advertising and solicitation practices. A motion was made by Barbara J. Behrens and seconded by Jean Bickal to approve the draft language as amended. The regulation with the additional language will be forwarded to the Regulatory Department for promulgation.

D. Assembly No. 3790 (Second Reprint)  
(Synopsis - Concerns access to physical therapy services, and insurance claims handling following access to such services.)  
- Introduced December 11, 2006

This matter was tabled until the December 18, 2007 Board meeting.

E. Letter from Madhurani Mahajan  
RE: Requirements for licensure

Ms. Mahajan previously wrote and advised the Board that she graduated after January of 2003 and has a bachelor's degree in physical therapy . Ms. Mahajan advised the Board that she noted that transitional-DPT (Doctor in Physical Therapy) programs are not CAPTE (Commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education) accredited programs. Ms. Mahajan inquired what she would need to do to in order to satisfy the educational requirements of N.J.S.A. 45:9-37.22( c), "an applicant must possess at least a master's degree from an accredited college or university in order to be eligible for licensure as a physical therapist in New Jersey, except for an applicant who prior to January 1, 2003 possessed a minimum of a bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university" and become eligible for licensure in New Jersey.

The Board advised Ms. Mahajan that transitional-DPT programs are not CAPTE accredited programs and would not satisfy the education requirements of N.J.S.A. 45:9-37.22( c) or N.J.A.C. 13:39A-4.1(a). The Board further advised Ms. Mahajan that she would need to complete an entry level master's or doctor of physical therapy degree from an accredited college or university physical therapy program in order to satisfy these requirements.

Ms. Mahajan wrote the Board again and asked them to reconsider their decision.

The Board will advise Ms. Mahajan that she would need to complete an entry level master's or doctor of physical therapy degree from an accredited college or university physical therapy program in order to satisfy the requirements of N.J.S.A. 45:9-37.22 ( c) and N.J.A.C. 13:39A-4.1(a).

### **E. Signed Settlement letter - Hampton Lee Beasley, PT**

The Board is in receipt of a signed Settlement letter from Hampton Lee Beasley, PT. The Board found the physical therapist violated N.J.S.A. 45:1-21(n) and N.J.A.C. 13:39A-2.4 as he aided and abetted aides, who are unlicensed, in performing tasks that require a physical therapist license. The physical therapist was issued a \$1,000.00 civil penalty and required to pay Board costs in the amount of \$306.00. The Board considers this matter to be concluded.

### **F. Signed Settlement letter - Cynthia Casey, PT**

The Board is in receipt of a signed Settlement letter from Cynthia Casey, PT. The Board found the physical therapist violated N.J.S.A. 45:1-21(n) and N.J.A.C. 13:39A-2.4 as she aided and abetted aides, who are unlicensed, in performing tasks that require a physical therapist license. The physical therapist was issued a \$1,000.00 civil penalty and required to pay Board costs in the amount of \$171.00. The Board considers this matter to be concluded.

### **G. Consent Order filed October 26, 2007 In the matter of Jeffrey Erickson, PT**

The Board is in receipt of a copy of the Consent Order filed October 26, 2007 in the matter of Jeffrey Erickson, PT. for violation of N.J.S.A. 45:1-21(n) and N.J.A.C. 13:39A-2.4. Mr. Erickson was issued a civil penalty in the amount of \$10,000.00 of which \$5,000.00 was stayed and was required to pay Board costs in the amount of \$468.00.

H. Consent Order filed October 26, 2007  
In the matter of Dean Pinciotti, PT

The Board is in receipt of a copy of the Consent Order filed October 26, 2007 in the matter of Dean Pinciotti, PT. for violation of N.J.S.A. 45:1-21(n) and N.J.A.C. 13:39A-2.4. Mr. Pinciotti was issued a civil penalty in the amount of \$10,000.00 of which \$5,000.00 was stayed and was required to pay Board costs in the amount of \$508.50.
