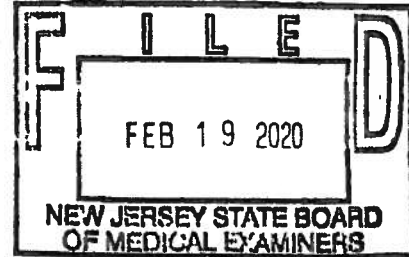

Administrative Action

FINAL CONSENT ORDER

This matter was opened to the New Jersey State Board of Medical Examiners ("Board") and the Acting Director of the New Jersey Division of Consumer Affairs ("Director"), upon receipt of information that on July 20, 2018, Martin Fried, M.D. ("Respondent"), then a licensed doctor in the State of New Jersey, was arrested and charged by the Toms River Police with illegal distribution of Controlled Dangerous Substances ("CDS"). Shortly thereafter, Respondent voluntarily surrendered his Drug Enforcement Administration ("DEA") registration and on September 17, 2018, signed a Consent Order relinquishing his license to practice medicine and

surgery in the State of New Jersey. As part of that Order, Respondent also agreed to enter the Professional Assistance Program ("PAP") in order to receive services for mental health issues.

On June 27, 2019, Respondent pled guilty in federal court before the Honorable Michael Shipp to one count of knowingly and intentionally attempting to distribute and possess with intent to distribute a quantity, specifically 630 milligrams of Oxycodone, a Schedule II CDS, outside the usual course of professional practice and not for a legitimate medical purpose contrary to 21 §§ USC 841 (a) and (b) (1) (c) in violation of USC § 846. On October 21, 2019, Respondent, who expressed remorse and took full responsibility for his actions, was sentenced to five years of probation. For six months of Respondent's probation he was subject to location monitoring, which required him to wear an ankle bracelet and confined him to his home except for purposes of employment, education, religious services, medical / mental health treatment and any court - ordered obligations. The court further required Respondent to continue receiving mental health treatment. Finally, the court imposed a five year restriction on Respondent practicing as a physician.

The Board finds that Respondent's conduct, as admitted in his guilty plea, constitutes professional misconduct; a conviction of an offense involving moral turpitude as well as one relating adversely to the practice of medicine; a failure to comply with regulations administered by the Board, specifically N.J.A.C. 13:35-7.6 (limitations on prescribing, administering, and dispensing CDS); and the indiscriminate prescribing of CDS, therefore providing grounds for the Board to revoke Respondent's license to practice medicine and surgery in New Jersey pursuant to N.J.S.A. 45:1-21(e), (f), (h), and (m).

Furthermore, prescribing CDS without a legitimate medical purpose is a violation of N.J.A.C. 13:45H-7.4, which provides the basis under N.J.S.A. 24:21-12(a)(3) for the Director to suspend or revoke Respondent's New Jersey CDS Registration.

The parties being desirous of resolving this matter without the necessity of further proceedings; and it appearing that Respondent has read the terms of the within Order and understands their meaning and effect and that he chooses to voluntarily enter into this Consent Order and to be bound by same after availing himself of the advice of counsel; and the Board and the Director finding the within Order adequately protective of the public health, safety and welfare; and it appearing that good cause exists for the entry of the within Order:

IT IS, therefore, on this 19th day of FEBRUARY 2020, ORDERED AND AGREED THAT:

1. The license of Martin D. Fried, M.D., License No. 25MA05030900, to practice medicine and surgery in the State of New Jersey is hereby actively suspended for a period of five years. Respondent's period of active suspension shall begin nunc pro tunc on October 21, 2019, the date on which Respondent was sentenced in federal court to a five year restriction on his ability to practice medicine.

2. Notwithstanding the term of suspension set forth herein, in no instance shall Respondent be granted a license during any period of incarceration or any period that he is under the conditions of a criminal sentence such as probation, supervised release, and/or a fine payment plan. Additionally, the period of ineligibility shall be tolled for any length of time that Respondent practices in another jurisdiction.

3. Pursuant to the authority of the Director under N.J.S.A. 24:21-9 to -15.3, Respondent's New Jersey CDS Registration, which expired in 2018, shall not be renewable for a

period of five years from October 21, 2019, the date on which Respondent was sentenced in federal court.

4. This suspension of Respondent's CDS Registration is independent of any action taken by the Board, the United States Drug Enforcement Administration ("DEA") or any other law enforcement or licensing authority. A copy of this Final Consent Order, signed by the Director, will be filed with the Division's Drug Control Unit.

5. Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 24:21-12(f), the Director shall promptly notify the DEA of the entry of this Final Consent Order.

6. Respondent shall continue to cease and desist all patient contact at any location in New Jersey and the rendering of medical care, including the issuance of any prescriptions for, or dispensation of, medications of any kind, including but not limited to CDS.

7. Respondent shall not enter the premises of his former medical practice during business hours when patients may be present. However, nothing contained in this Order shall prohibit Respondent from using the physical premises where he had been practicing medicine prior to the voluntary cessation of his practice, for a purpose other than a medical practice.

8. Respondent shall not charge, receive or share in any fee for professional services rendered by others. Respondent shall be permitted to collect accounts receivable with respect to professional services that he rendered prior to September 17, 2018.

9. Respondent shall comply with N.J.A.C. 13:35-6.5(h), the Board regulation for practice closure. Within ten days of the filing of this Consent Order, Respondent is to notify William V. Roeder, Executive Director, New Jersey State Board of Medical Examiners, 140 East Front Street, P.O. Box 183, Trenton, New Jersey 08625-0183 as to where his patient records are secured, and how patients may obtain them.

10. Respondent shall be precluded from managing, overseeing, supervising or influencing the practice of medicine or provision of healthcare activities, including by testifying as an expert witness, in the State of New Jersey until further Order of the Board.

11. Respondent shall divest himself from any current and future financial interest in or benefit derived from the practice of medicine until further Order of the Board.

12. Respondent, if he has not already done so, shall return his original New Jersey license, current biennial registration and CDS registration to the New Jersey State Board of Medical Examiners, 140 E. Front Street, P.O. Box 183, Trenton, New Jersey 08625-0183.

13. Respondent, if he has not already done so, shall immediately send all of his remaining prescription blanks, along with a cover memorandum indicating that he will no longer be writing prescriptions and asking that his prescription blanks be destroyed pursuant to standard operating procedures, to Dana Pulizzano, Acting Executive Director, Drug Control Unit, P.O. Box 45045, Newark, NJ 07101.

14. Respondent shall comply with the attached "Directives Applicable to Any Medical Board Licensee who is Disciplined or Whose Surrender of Licensure or Cessation of Practice has been Ordered or Agreed Upon."

15. Prior to any restoration of his license, Respondent shall undertake the following:

a. Continue to participate in the Professional Assistance Program ("PAP") and comply with the requirements of the program, which shall include but not be limited to:

i. Comply with a treatment program as recommended and approved by the PAP as well as any and all recommendations made by that program for ongoing treatment;

- ii. Abstain from the use of all psychoactive substances, including alcohol and medications containing alcohol, unless prescribed by a treating physician for a documented medical condition, with notification from Respondent's treating physician to the PAP of the diagnosis, treatment plan, prognosis and medications prescribed;
 - iii. Comply with the random drug screens for the duration of his treatment on a frequency as determined by the Executive Medical Director of the PAP;
 - iv. Comply with the face-to-face follow up meetings with the PAP on a monthly basis, until further Order of the Board or until the Executive Medical Director of the PAP recommends, in writing, a reduction in the frequency of these meetings;
 - v. Sign releases with his treating physicians and counselors so that the PAP may ascertain his level of compliance and progress with treatment;
- b. Appear before the Board, or a Committee thereof, with the support of the PAP, to discuss his readiness to re-enter the practice of medicine. At that time, Respondent shall be prepared to propose his plans for future practice in New Jersey;
 - c. Affirmatively establish his fitness, competence and capacity to re-enter the active practice of medicine as a physician within New Jersey;
 - d. Provide the Board with evidence that he is capable of discharging the functions of a licensee in a manner consistent with the public's health, safety and welfare and that he is not then suffering from any impairment or limitation which could affect his practice;

- e. Provide the Board with detailed discharge summaries from any program and reports from each and every mental health professional (including, but not limited to: psychologists, counselors, therapists, psychiatrists) who have participated in Respondent's care and/or treatment for the disability in this matter during the period of time from the date the within Order is filed to his successful discharge from the program;
- f. Provide the Board with a report from the PAP detailing the nature and extent of his involvement with that entity, and whether he has abided by the recommendations made by the PAP; and
- g. Provide the Board with a full account of his conduct during the intervening period of time from his entry into this Order to his appearance.

16. The parties hereby stipulate that entry of this Order is without prejudice to further action, investigation, and prosecution by this Board, the Attorney General, the Drug Control Unit, the Director of the Division of Consumer Affairs or other law enforcement resulting from Respondent's conduct not addressed by the terms of this Order. The Board shall retain jurisdiction to enforce the terms of this Order. Upon receipt of any reliable information indicating that Respondent has violated any term of this Order, the Board reserves the right to bring further disciplinary action.







**DIRECTIVES APPLICABLE TO ANY MEDICAL BOARD LICENSEE
WHO IS DISCIPLINED OR WHOSE SURRENDER OF LICENSURE
OR CESSATION OF PRACTICE HAS BEEN ORDERED OR AGREED UPON**

APPROVED BY THE BOARD ON AUGUST 12, 2015

All licensees who are the subject of a disciplinary order or surrender or cessation order (herein after, "Order") of the Board shall provide the information required on the addendum to these directives. Failure to provide the information required may result in further disciplinary action for failing to cooperate with the Board, as required by N.J.A.C. 13:45C-1 et seq: Paragraphs 1 through 4 below shall apply when a licensee is suspended, revoked, has surrendered his or her license, or entered into an agreement to cease practice, with or without prejudice, whether on an interim or final basis. Paragraph 5 applies to licensees who are the subject of an order which, while permitting continued practice, contains probationary terms or monitoring requirement.

1. Document Return and Agency Notification

The licensee shall promptly forward to the Board office at Post Office Box 183, 140 East Front Street, 2nd floor, Trenton, New Jersey 08625-0183, the original license, current biennial registration and, if applicable, the original CDS registration. In addition, if the licensee holds a Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) registration, he or she shall promptly advise the DEA of the licensure action. (With respect to suspensions of a finite term, at the conclusion of the term, the licensee may contact the Board office for the return of the documents previously surrendered to the Board. Prior to the resumption of any prescribing of controlled dangerous substances, the licensee shall petition the Director of Consumer Affairs for a return of the CDS registration if the basis for discipline involved CDS misconduct. In addition, at the conclusion of the term, the licensee should contact the DEA to advise of the resumption of practice and to ascertain the impact of that change upon his/her DEA registration.)

2. Practice Cessation

The licensee shall cease and desist from engaging in the practice of medicine in this State. This prohibition not only bars a licensee from rendering professional services, but also from providing an opinion as to professional practice or its application, or representing him/herself as being eligible to practice. (Although the licensee need not affirmatively advise patients or others of the revocation, suspension, surrender or

cessation, the licensee must truthfully disclose his/her licensure status in response to inquiry.) The licensee subject to the order is also prohibited from occupying, sharing or using office space in which another licensee provides health care services. The licensee subject to the order may contract for, accept payment from another licensee for rent at fair market value for office premises and/or equipment. In no case may the licensee subject to the order authorize, allow or condone the use of his/her provider number by any health care practice or any other licensee or health care provider. In situations where the licensee has been subject to the order for less than one year, the licensee may accept payment from another professional who is using his/her office during the period that the licensee is (suspended), subject to the order for the payment of salaries for office staff employed at the time of the Board action.

A licensee whose license has been revoked, suspended or subject to a surrender or cessation order for one (1) year or more must immediately take steps to remove signs and take affirmative action to stop advertisements by which his/her eligibility to practice is represented. The licensee must also take steps to remove his/her name from professional listings, telephone directories, professional stationery, or billings. If the licensee's name is utilized in a group practice title, it shall be deleted. Prescription pads bearing the licensee's name shall be destroyed. A destruction report form obtained from the Office of Drug Control (973-504-6558) must be filed. If no other licensee is providing services at the location, all medications must be removed and returned to the manufacturer, if possible, destroyed or safeguarded. (In situations where a license has been suspended for less than one year, prescription pads and medications need not be destroyed but must be secured in a locked place for safekeeping.)

3. Practice Income Prohibitions/Divestiture of Equity Interest in Professional Service Corporations and Limited Liability Companies

A licensee subject to the order shall not charge, receive or share in any fee for professional services rendered by him/herself or others while barred from engaging in the professional practice.¹ The licensee may be compensated for the reasonable value of services lawfully rendered and disbursements

This bar on the receipt of any fee for professional services is not applicable to cease and desist orders where there are no findings that would be a basis for Board action, such as those entered adjourning a hearing.

incurred on a patient's behalf prior to the effective date of the Board order.

A licensee who is a shareholder in a professional service corporation organized to engage in the professional practice, whose license is revoked, surrendered or suspended or who is ordered to cease practice for a term of one (1) year or more shall be deemed to be disqualified from the practice within the meaning of the Professional Service Corporation Act. (N.J.S.A. 14A:17-11). A disqualified licensee shall divest him/herself of all financial interest in the professional service corporation pursuant to N.J.S.A. 14A:17-13©. A disqualified licensee who is a member of a limited liability company organized pursuant to N.J.S.A. 42:1-44, shall also divest him/herself of all financial interest. Such divestiture of the licensee's interest in the limited liability company or professional service corporation shall occur within 90 days following the entry of the order rendering the licensee disqualified to participate in the applicable form of ownership. Upon divestiture, a licensee shall forward to the Board a copy of documentation forwarded to the Division of Revenue and Enterprise Services demonstrating that the interest has been terminated. If the licensee is the sole shareholder in a professional service corporation or sole member of the limited liability company, the corporation must be dissolved within 90 days of the licensee's disqualification unless it is lawfully transferred to another licensee and documentation of the valuation process and consideration paid is also provided to the Board.

4. Medical Records

If, as a result of the Board's action, a practice is closed or transferred to another location, the licensee shall ensure that (during the three (3) month period) immediately following the effective date of the disciplinary order, a message will be delivered to patients calling the former office premises, advising where records may be obtained. The message should inform patients of the names and telephone numbers of the licensee (or his/her attorney) assuming custody of the records. The same information shall also be disseminated by means of a notice to be published at least once per month for three (3) months in a newspaper of general circulation in the geographic vicinity in which the practice was conducted. If the licensee has a website, a notice shall be posted on the website as well.

At the end of the three month period, the licensee shall file with the Board the name and telephone number of the contact person who will have access to medical records of former

patients. Any change in that individual or his/her telephone number shall be promptly reported to the Board. When a patient or his/her representative requests a copy of his/her medical record or asks that record be forwarded to another health care provider, the licensee shall promptly provide the record without charge to the patient.

5. Probation/Monitoring Conditions

With respect to any licensee who is the subject of any order imposing a probation or monitoring requirement or a stay of an active suspension, in whole or in part, which is conditioned upon compliance with a probation or monitoring requirement, the licensee shall fully cooperate with the Board and its designated representatives, including the Enforcement Bureau of the Division of Consumer Affairs, in ongoing monitoring of the licensee's status and practice. Such monitoring shall be at the expense of the disciplined practitioner.

(a) Monitoring of practice conditions may include, but is not limited to, inspection of the professional premises and equipment, and inspection and copying of patient records (confidentiality of patient identity shall be protected by the Board) to verify compliance with the Board Order and accepted standards of practice.

(b) Monitoring of status conditions for an impaired practitioner may include, but is not limited to, practitioner cooperation in providing releases permitting unrestricted access to records and other information to the extent permitted by law from any treatment facility, other treating practitioner, support group or other individual/facility involved in the education, treatment, monitoring or oversight of the practitioner, or maintained by a rehabilitation program for impaired practitioners. If bodily substance monitoring has been ordered, the practitioner shall fully cooperate by responding to a demand for breath, blood, urine or other sample in a timely manner and providing the designated sample.

6. Payment of Civil and Criminal Penalties and Costs.

With respect to any licensee who is the subject of any order imposing a civil penalty and/or costs, the licensee shall satisfy the payment obligations within the time period ordered by the Board or be subject to collection efforts or the filing of a certificate of debt. The Board shall not consider any application for reinstatement nor shall any appearance before a committee of the Board seeking reinstatement be scheduled until such time as the Board ordered payments are satisfied in full. (The Board at

its discretion may grant installment payments for not more than a 24 months period.)

As to the satisfaction of criminal penalties and civil forfeitures, the Board will consider a reinstatement application so long as the licensee is current in his or her payment plans.

**NOTICE OF REPORTING PRACTICES OF BOARD
REGARDING DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS**

All Orders filed by the New Jersey State Board of Medical Examiners are "government records" as defined under the Open Public Records Act and are available for public inspection, copying or Examination. See N.J.S.A. 47:1A-1, et seq., N.J.S.A. 52:14B-3(3). Should any inquiry be made to the Board concerning the status of a licensee who has been the subject of a Board Order, the inquirer will be informed of the existence of the Order and a copy will be provided on request. Unless sealed or otherwise confidential, all documents filed in public actions taken against licensees, to include documents filed or introduced into evidence in evidentiary hearings, proceedings on motions or other applications conducted as public hearings, and the transcripts of any such proceedings, are "government records" available for public inspection, copying or examination.

Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 45:9-22, a description of any final board disciplinary action taken within the most recent ten years is included on the New Jersey Health Care Profile maintained by the Division of Consumer Affairs for all licensed physicians. Links to copies of Orders described thereon are also available on the Profile website. See <http://www.njdoctorlist.com>.

Copies of disciplinary Orders entered by the Board are additionally posted and available for inspection or download on the Board of Medical Examiners' website. See <http://njconsumeraffairs.gov/bme>.

Pursuant to federal law, the Board is required to report to the National Practitioner Data Bank (the "NPDB") certain adverse licensure actions taken against licensees related to professional competence or conduct, generally including the revocation or suspension of a license; reprimand; censure; and/or probation. Additionally, any negative action or finding by the Board that, under New Jersey law, is publicly available information is reportable to the NPDB, to include, without limitation, limitations on scope of practice and final adverse actions that occur in conjunction with settlements in which no finding of liability has been made. Additional information regarding the specific actions which the Board is required to report to the National Practitioner Data Bank can be found in the NPDB Guidebook issued by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services in April 2015. Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 45:9-19.13, in any case in which the Board refuses to issue, suspends, revokes or otherwise places conditions on a license or permit, the Board is required to notify each licensed health care facility and health maintenance organization in this state with whom he or she is directly associated in private medical practice.

In accordance with an agreement with the Federation of State Medical Boards of the United States, a list of all disciplinary orders entered by the Board is provided to the Federation on a monthly basis.

From time to time, the Press Office of the Division of Consumer Affairs may issue press releases including information regarding public actions taken by the Board.

Nothing herein is intended in any way to limit the Board, the Division of Consumer Affairs or the Attorney General from disclosing any public document.
